LEARNER AT THE CENTRE-DIVERSITY-SOCIAL NATURE OF LEARNING

What a great start we have had to our new school year. The staff worked hard in the last few days of the holidays to get everything ready and organised and the students returned with smiles on their faces and tales of their holidays.

On January 27th, the teachers attended an in-school professional learning session on our new writing program. We welcomed a team from Seven Steps to Writing Success who were interested in hearing how we structure our school and plan on rolling out this new approach. Work began straight away with the students learning all about 'Sizzling Starts'. They recorded their 'Wow' or 'Ouch' moment from their holidays and have been learning about a range of techniques they can engage to capture the reader within 7 seconds. These techniques include starting with an action, a moment of change, a sound, humour, dialogue, a question, or a word picture. The students in Years 5 and 6 have been playing with lots of different options, which you can read through on the next page, along with the sounds that they used as inspiration prompts.

The students have also been enjoying learning how to sign as part of our new Language-Other-Than-English (LOTE) subject, Auslan. Serena Thomas has inspired the students and staff alike to use sign language as part of our everyday communication and I have heard from several parents that their children are coming home from school and teaching them a range of signs. Serena has also started to build a relationship with Tracey, who has been teaching Auslan at Belvedere Community Centre. Their collaboration will ensure that the students experience authentic interactions between fluent speakers and develop a deep understanding of the social importance of knowing how to communicate with all members of our community.

Another change to our schedule has been the extension of our Physical Education program. Grant Oldaker has doubled his time fraction so now, every student at our school attends two Physical Education sessions per week. We have also introduced a Sport rotation into our Fascination Friday activities so there is plenty of movement built into the week.

All of this and we're less than 5 weeks into our school year. 2023 is all set to be very successful.

The School Leaders have been going over and reading through our Schools Student Dress Code Policy. We have been creating a powerpoint to show the students in depth, in classrooms. HOUSE CAPTAINS

Every fortnight the school does Fascination Friday rotations. This is a new activity we do, we get into our four different houses: Heath, Wattle, Banksia and Bluegum.

Firstly, we interviewed Tuscany in Grade1:


- We asked her how do you like your new classroom furniture? She said: she likes it because it's how she would like it.

Age: 12 (in the first book, he ages up throughout the



Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief is a perfect mix between Greek mythology and the modern world. It's filled with action but you also learn a thing or two about Greek mythology. When Percy finds out he's a Demigod the journey gets harder. During `capture the flag` Percy finds out he's a son of one of the big three, Zeus, Poseidon, and Hades. He discovers he's the son of Poseidon. Percy is faced with a quest. His friend Grover



comes with him and his soon to be friend Annabeth. 


SOCCER X

IGNITE THE SPARK

Over the past 12 months, we have raised over \$65,000 locally as part of our Ignite the SPark campaign. We have used the money raised to :

- Cover the costs of completing the ground marking, which will be carried out in 2023
- Replace the furniture in two more classrooms
- Replace the goal posts on the oval

Our shade sail was returned to us just on time for the students to return to school at the beginning of the year. Graeme and Linda spent time in the Indigenous Garden over the holidays and have agreed to continue to work with us to ensure our grounds are well maintained. This allows us to begin organising the official opening of the Indigenous Garden so keep an eye out for more details.

As the student leaders mentioned above, the bulk of the furniture in the Year 1 and 2 classrooms arrived in February and looks great. There are a few last pieces that we are waiting for (ottomans and cushions) and we will then start the process of ordering furniture for the Year 3 and 4 classrooms. We are about half-way through our fundraising for this project and hope that the upcoming Colour Explosion Fun Run puts us over the line.

We are very grateful to all families who have supported our efforts.


