LEARNER AT THE CENTRE-DIVERSITY-SOCIAL NATURE OF LEARNING

Today is the last day of Term 2 and it's also the final day of Semester 1. This semester has seen our new Prep cohort settle into primary school with enthusiasm and excitement and they have demonstrated tremendous growth in their understanding of how words work and the foundational skills in Mathematics. In particular, they have been practising 'suddenly seeing' quantities without having to count. Our student leaders have also embraced their roles with high competence and they are now at the stage where they can independently organise themselves for the morning announcements and confidently address the school community. Our fortnightly assemblies are a festival of celebrations, with no adult voices heard. Congratulations to all of our students on the responsibility they have taken for their own learning.

Semester reports were released to parents and carers on Wednesday this week. Report writing is a highly involved process for teachers. They spend weeks confirming their judgements (progression points) using data collected formatively through the term in the students' class work and exit tickets, and summatively using formal assessments. Please take some time over the term break to read your child(ren)'s report(s) thoroughly – they provide you with an in-depth summary of your child's understanding against the Victorian Curriculum standards and the teachers' comments provide you with ideas as to how you can help your child to continue their learning journey in Semester 2. You will be invited to discuss your child's semester report with their teacher(s) early in Term 3.

One of the obstacles we have encountered in reporting on our students' progress has been high rates of absenteeism and students arriving at school after the 9am bell. We always encourage parents and carers to keep their children at home if they are physically unwell. Family holidays during the school term, however, have a heavy impact on student learning. While we understand that family events are a great opportunity to celebrate together, we respectfully request that time away from school for holidays are kept to a minimum in order to maximise the opportunities for students to engage fully with the curriculum. Arriving at school at 8:45am in the morning gives students an opportunity to catch up with their friends and prepare themselves for a day of learning. It's a joy to watch the students run to their classrooms as soon as the music starts to play at 8:58am and organise their belongings, ready to start their targeted learning tasks during English Enhancement.



The specialist teachers have been busy designing and implementing programs for the students in Visual Arts, Performing Arts, Auslan and Physical Education. The students are responding very well to their new LOTE (Language Other Than English) course, Auslan. They are communicating through sign language during their weekly lessons and transferring those skills into their generalist classroom and onto the yard during their social interactions with their friends. They engage in two physical education lessons (one double for the students in Years 5 and 6) per week, which equates to 100 minutes in total. They have responded to this extended time of physical education with glee, and this has resulted in a stronger sporting culture. Our footy field and soccer pitch are so heavily used now that replacing the goals was prioritised this semester as our fundraising goal. The footy goals are in place and the soccer/rugby goals will arrive in Term 3. Thank you for helping us to Ignite the SPark.

I hope that all of the students and staff of Seaford Park Primary School have a lovely term break with family and friends.

ENVIRONMENT LEADERS



Congratulations to Archie who has demonstrated our school value of Social Nature of Learning during our sessions this term.




ANNUAL IMPLEMENTATION PLAN MID CYCLE REVIEW

The work that we have done in Semester 1 to improve student outcomes, particularly in Writing and Maths was commended by our Senior Education Improvement Leader, Michael Devine, at our mid-cycle review last week.

Our four-year school review is scheduled for Term 1, 2024 and, in preparation for that, we will be running lots of focus groups in Semester 2 to gather the thoughts, opinions and ideas of our school community – students, parents and staff. Please watch out for the invitations to participate and join us if you can. This is a great opportunity for all members of our community to collaborate towards building a strategic plan that will inform our continued progress between 2024 and 2028.



ATTITUDES TO SCHOOL SURVEY

The preliminary results from our Attitudes to School Survey have been released and indicate another strong result from the students. The key numbers indicate positive endorsements in all areas of the survey:

Our analysis of the data indicates that:

- We have met all our Strategic Plan Targets, as illustrated on the table above.
- 'High expectations for success' is our highest score (99% endorsement), which is also the highest rated factors state-wide (93%)
- 'Attitudes to attendance' (97%) and 'School connectedness' (96%) are also in our top three.
- 'Student voice and agency' (86%), 'Emotional awareness and regulation (86%) and 'Life satisfaction' (85%) are our three lowest scoring factors. These factors are also in the bottom 3 in our five-year averages and according to state averages.



IGNITE THE SPARK

Over the past 12 months, we have raised over \$30,000 locally as part of our Ignite the SPark campaign. We have used the money raised to :

- Replace the furniture in five more classrooms
- Replace the goal posts on the oval, some of which have been installed
- Upgrade our reading resources in the classrooms and in the school library



Our current focus is on providing high quality take-home books for the students so they can practise their targeted skills with their family and friends. We are hoping to pay for our new resources with \$10,000 coming from the school budget and the remaining \$10,000 paid for using locally raised funds. Once we have achieved this fundraising target, we will begin working on replacing all of the bubbler taps around the school with more functional and user-friendly alternatives.

We are very grateful to all families who have supported our efforts.

You may also have noticed that our new flag poles have been installed – we will organise a first raising of the flags early in Term 3. Alongside the flag poles is our new Anzac memorial, commemorating those who have 'gone before in defence of this nation.' We are grateful to the RSL for their support with this project.


