LEARNER AT THE CENTRE-DIVERSITY-SOCIAL NATURE OF LEARNING

Welcome back for Term 4. The team at Seaford Park Primary School returned with a lot of enthusiasm as we finish off the year's curriculum with the students and start to prepare them for their transition into their new year level. For one cohort, that means transitioning out of primary school and into secondary college! It is an exciting and nerve-racking time for students, parents and teachers but we are always excited about the adventures and opportunities that are coming our way.

Our incoming Prep students begin their transition on November 1st when they come to meet with their teacher. As our building begins to fill-up, the Department of Education have directed us to only accept children who live inside our zone, according to the Find My School website and children who have a sibling already enrolled. This directive is valid for one-year and will be reviewed next year if our overall numbers drop but, for the Preps in 2024, it means they will likely be part of a small grade (less than 20). We have already had some inquiries about our 2025 cohort. Unfortunately, we cannot accept enrolments at this time. The Department of Education have not released the opening date for acceptance of enrolments yet so please keep an eye out on announcements in February or March.

With Halloween coming up, we have noticed a lot of students on the yard before and after school wearing costumes. Some of our students have found these images very confronting so students and parents are reminded that only school appropriate costumes should be worn at school (including before and after school) and masks and face coverings should be avoided.

Term 4 is always busy with incursions, excursions, camps, swimming, our community night, Carols by Daylight, ..., the list goes on. This year, the excitement started early with a native animals incursion at the end of Term 3. The cost of the incursion was covered by Ardoch so ensuring that the learning experience was free of charge for all students. We are grateful for the support we have received from Ardoch this year and look forward to our continued partnership in 2024.




LIBRARY LEADERS

PARENT/CARER/GUARDIAN OPINION SURVEY

Thank you to the 90 families who responded to our Parent/Carer/Guardian Opinion Survey last term. The range of responses received since 2017 has ranged between 10 and 35 so we are delighted with the high levels of engagement. The information gathered will support us as we prepare for and work through our school review in Term 1, 2024.

SUNSMART POLICY

The spring weather is certainly playing tricks on us and keeping us on our toes. We expect that it will all start to settle soon and, predictions are that it will be a hot, dry summer. It is important that all families are aware of our Sunsmart Policy and that you remind your child of the importance of applying sunscreen every morning and wearing a hat outside. As well as their regular play times, students will have opportunities to conduct some of their learning activities outside so it's imperative that every child has a wide-brimmed hat at school every day. Bucket hats and caps are not appropriate.

Sunscreen is available at school for the students to apply and families are encouraged to provide roll-on sunscreen for children to avoid any potential allergic reactions. Please note that teachers are not permitted to assist students to apply sunscreen but will remind the students before going outside.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST STUDENTS AT SEAFORD PARK

Seaford Park Primary School has partnered with Monash University and will have Occupational Therapy Students working with our students this year.

Occupational Therapists can support students with a range of areas including development of fine motor skills (e.g. drawing, writing, cutting), self-care skills (e.g. dressing, shoe-laces, toileting), regulation, play & social skills; as well as supporting students to participate & engage in their learning.

The OT students will work alongside the teachers to provide whole classroom strategies, as well as with students within the classroom, and may also work with small groups and individuals. They will be supervised by occupational therapist, Tris Tanumihardjo, who will oversee their practice and be on site for approximately 10 hours per week.

Please let your child's classroom teacher know if you would not like the OT students to interact with your child. Should your child be identified for small group or 1:1 support you will be provided with a consent form to complete.

IGNITE THE SPARK

Over the past 12 months, we have raised almost \$35,000 locally as part of our Ignite the SPark campaign. We have used the money raised to:

- Replace the furniture in five more classrooms
- Replace the goal posts on the oval, some of which have been installed, and purchase new safety pads
- Upgrade our reading resources in the classrooms and in the school library



Our current focus is on providing high quality take-home books for the students so they can practise their targeted skills with their family and friends. We are hoping to pay for our new resources with \$10,000 coming from the school budget and the remaining \$10,000 paid for using locally raised funds. Once we have achieved this fundraising target, we will begin working on replacing all of the bubbler taps around the school with more functional and user-friendly alternatives. We are very grateful to all families who continually support our efforts.


